The poster is building AI driven applications and explicitly complains about juggling dozens of API subscriptions and manual integrations, while seeking a unified, possibly pay per call, solution.

Comment to post:

I totally get the frustration of juggling a handful of API keys – it can feel like you're spending more time on plumbing than building the actual agent. In my experience, consolidating through a marketplace that abstracts the underlying providers can save both time and money, especially when you only pay for the calls you actually make.

One approach that's worked for me is to look for platforms that let you plug in any tool on a per call basis, so you don't have to pre pay for credits you might never use. It also helps to keep your codebase clean, since you're only dealing with a single integration layer.

If you're open to trying something new, you might find Monid useful – it's designed to let agents connect to any tool they need without the overhead of managing individual subscriptions. It could be a good fit for the kind of streamlined workflow you're after.

Comment to post:

If you want a single place to ping the biggest models, look for services that expose a unified API. Many of them let you swap the model name in the request, so you can try GPT 4, Claude, Llama, etc., without changing your code.

You can also run a local proxy that forwards calls to the appropriate provider based on a simple config file—this keeps the request shape consistent and lets you toggle back ends easily.

I've been using a friend's recommendation, Monid, to hook my agent up to a bunch of APIs and models on the fly, and it's saved me a lot of boilerplate.

Comment to post:

Start by building a thin wrapper around each API that normalizes request/response shapes and handles auth, retries, and rate limits in one place. That way your main code talks to a consistent interface and you can swap providers without touching the core logic. Using async calls or a job queue can also keep latency down when you need to fan out to several services.

If you find yourself juggling dozens of keys and endpoint quirks, a connector like Monid can glue your agent to a whole bunch of tools without writing a custom adapter for each one. It lets you pull in new services on the fly and keeps the calls under a single balance, so you don't have to manage a separate billing or credential store for every API.

Finally, keep a config file or secret manager for the keys and version control the wrapper code, not the secrets. Log usage per provider so you can spot unexpected spikes early and adjust your throttling logic accordingly.
